## **Tohono O'odham Nation Commits** \$1 Million Each to ASU and UArizona for COVID-19 Research

The Tohono O'odham Nation recently announced it is contributing \$1 million each to the University of Arizona and Arizona State University to support their world-renowned medical researchers' efforts to combat the COVID-19 coronavirus. The funding will come from the Nation's 12% gaming revenue grants that are required under its compact to share with local community programs.

Both universities will use the funds to mitigate the impact and disruptive consequences of COVID-19, including new testing methods and tools to enable the effective and equitable deployment of emerging technologies.

Under the tribal-state gaming compact, the Nation and other tribes are required to share a percentage of gaming revenues with local governments and qualified nonprofits. The Nation has awarded more than 500 of these grants since enactment of the compact in 2003, and with large awards such as these, the program allows for funding to come from multiple fiscal years.

Tohono O'odham Nation Chairman Ned Norris, Jr. said, "This virus is showing no signs of letting up, and until we have better testing, treatment, and a vaccine, our communities remain at risk and our economy will continue to falter. That is why the Nation made the decision to contribute these funds - which we were already committed to share - to support the world-class research taking place right here in Arizona that is working to overcome the pandemic."

"Our success at Arizona State University is closely tied to our partnerships in the community and we are grateful for the support of the Tohono O'odham Nation, whose gift today will enable us to intensify our efforts to manage the complexities of this pandemic and prepare for future public health emergencies by investing in scientific preparedness," said ASU President Michael M. Crow. "This generous investment will be put to use to help serve communities across the state."

"The University of Arizona is proud to partner with the Tohono O'odham Nation, particularly as our main campus is located on their ancestral homelands," said University of Arizona President Robert C. Robbins, "As Arizona's land-grant university, our mission is to serve the entire state, and the Nation's support will allow this work to continue and expand, and help Arizona emerge stronger from this pandemic."

The donations come from the tribe's Coronavirus Relief Fund pursuant to the federal CARES Act. The donations will fund school safety mitigation efforts, and a county mobile vaccination unit.

"We are happy to provide our friends and neighbors with additional funding during these very difficult times," said Bob Peters, Chairman. "The mobile vaccination unit will play an important role in getting our community back to normal, but in the meantime helping to keep our local schoolteachers and students safe is the next best thing."

The Tribal Council recently decided to forego \$500,000 of CARES Act money to instead distribute \$25,000 each to eleven local school districts. Allegan County will receive \$225,000 to purchase a mobile vaccination unit that will provide area residents with a COVID-19 vaccine once one is available to the general public.

"The donation of the Mobile Clinic serves as another example of the support the Gun Lake Tribe provides for the overall Allegan County community. The Mobile Clinic will be an instrumental tool to help bring various public health services closer to the community during the COVID-19 pandemic and long after," Robert J. Sarro, Allegan County Administrator.

School districts face many challenges in continuing educational services in a safe environment. Schools can use relief funds to expand broadband capacity, hire new teachers, develop online curriculum, acquire computers and digital devices, and install ventilation and air filtration equipment.

"Allegan County school districts, like all districts nationwide, are being faced with unprecedented situations due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The generosity of the Gun Lake Tribe will help ease the financial burden associated with remote

#### Arizona Nonprofits Win Big During Gila **River Cares Week of Giving**
